- **10:15 – 11:30:** State Department Office of Religious and Global Affairs
The Office of Religion and Global Affairs (RGA) works to implement the National Strategy on Religious Leader and Faith Community Engagement through three overarching roles for the Department. It has the following mission: advising State Department leadership on policy matters as they relate to religion; supporting Posts and Bureaus in assessing religious dynamics and engaging religious actors; serving as a first point of entry for those seeking to engage the State Department on matters of religion and global affairs. Search for Common Ground (SFCG) was founded on the basis that conflict turns into violence when people focus on their differences rather than on their commonalities. SFCG seeks to find new ways of connecting people across these differences. SFCG first focused on facilitating cooperation between the United States and the Soviet Union. Since its founding, the organization has expanded its work to 30 countries in Africa, Asia, the Middle East and parts of Eastern Europe. SFCG's first office in the Middle East was established in 1991. The organization started working in Europe in 1994, in Africa in 1995, and in Asia in 2002. The Washington Post is an American daily newspaper. Times*, and *The Wall Street Journal*. *The Washington Post* has distinguished itself through its political reporting on the workings of the White House, Congress, and other aspects of the U.S. government. The Middle East Broadcasting Networks (MBN) is an Arabic-language news organization with a weekly audience of more than 27.5 million people in 22 countries in the Middle East and North Africa, countries Freedom House deemed “not free” or “partly free” in 2016. MBN networks support democratic values by expanding the spectrum of ideas in the region and engaging audiences to share perspectives. - **11:00 – 12:30: United States Department Commission on Religious Freedom**
The United States Commission on international Religious Freedom (USCIRF) is an independent, bipartisan U.S. federal government commission created by the 1998 International Religious Freedom Act (IRFA) that monitors the universal right to freedom of religion or belief abroad. USCIRF uses international standards to monitor religious freedom violations globally, and makes policy recommendations to the President, the Secretary of State, and Congress. Soliya is a network of staff, universities, volunteers, trainers and coaches, experienced in the fields of new media, new technology, social entrepreneurship, conflict resolution, advocacy and international affairs. In 2009 Soliya became a UNAOC partner and has been supporting UNAOC’s efforts to engage young people and to use media and communications technologies to foster greater cross-cultural understanding. The Connect Program is Soliya’s flagship virtual exchange initiative. It is an online cross-cultural education program integrated into curriculum that provides students with a unique opportunity to establish a deeper understanding for the perspectives of others around the world on important socio-political issues. Since 2003, the Connect Program has linked students from over 100 universities in 27 countries in the Middle East, North Africa, South Asia, Europe and North America. (<http://soliya.net>)

The United Nations Alliance of Civilizations (UNAOC) was established in 2005, at the political initiative of then UN Secretary General Mr. Kofi Annan, and co-sponsored by the Governments of Spain and Turkey. A High-Level Group of experts was formed by Mr. Annan to explore the roots of polarization between societies and cultures today, and recommend a practical program of action to address the issue. In 2006, the High-Level Group identified four priority areas: Education, Youth, Migration, and Media. The UNAOC projects and activities revolve around these areas, guided by the assumption that they can play a critical role in reducing intercultural tensions and in building bridges between nations. In 2013, Mr. Nassir Abdulaziz Al-Nasser became UN High Representative for the Alliance of Civilizations, operating with UNAOC Secretariat from New York City. (www.unaoc.org)

The UN Secretary-General (UNSG) has identified in his second term working with and for young people as one of his top priorities. In this regard, he established in 2013 the Office of the Secretary-General’s Envoy on Youth with a mandate to harmonize the UN system efforts on youth development, enhance the UN response to youth needs, advocate for addressing the development needs and rights of young people, as well as to bring the work of the United Nations with and for youth closer to them. TOGETHER is a growing coalition of Member States, private sector, civil society representatives and individuals committed to change negative narratives on migration and to

Cable News Network (CNN) is an American cable and satellite television news channel owned by Time Warner. Upon its launch, CNN was the first television channel to provide 24-hour news coverage, and was the first all-news television channel in the United States. Since its debut, CNN has expanded its reach to a number of cable and satellite television providers, several websites, and specialized closed-circuit channels. The company has 42 bureaus (11 domestic, 31 international), more than 900 affiliated local stations, and several regional and foreign-language networks around the world. CNN's current weekday schedule consists mostly of rolling news programming during daytime hours, followed by in-depth news and factual programs during the evening and primetime hours. National Public Radio (NPR) is an American privately and publicly funded non-profit membership media organization that serves as a national syndicator to a network of 900 public radio stations in the United States. NPR produces and distributes news and cultural programming. Individual public radio stations are not required to broadcast all NPR programs that are produced. Most public radio stations broadcast a mixture of NPR programs, content from rival providers American Public Media, Public Radio International, Public Radio Exchange and WNYC Studios and locally produced programs. NPR's flagships are two drive time news broadcasts, Morning Edition and the afternoon All Things Considered; both are carried by most NPR member stations, and are two of the most popular radio programs in the country. Ethnic media outlets provide a cultural, political, and educational lifeline to the 36 percent of the city's population that is foreign-born. Of those, 1.8 million residents (23 percent of the population) speak little or no English. Ethnic media serve as a bridge between new arrivals and more established immigrants and ensure that the next generation, though assimilated, remains connected to its heritage. Dialog Macht Schule is German for “Dialogue with school”. It teaches schools on ways to commit to a democracy in which all social groups can shape society regardless of their social and cultural origins. The association aims at helping schools to meet the demands of an increasingly diverse student body. It also help schools promote democratic awareness to encourage students to develop into self-determined individuals, guided by their own strengths and in collaboration with others’. Dialogue in school has been designed by taking into consideration the needs of ethnically diverse schools with a high proportion of socially disadvantaged students. Give Something Back To Berlin is the largest project platform and network that makes social engagement and neighbourhood work accessible to the large migrant population of Berlin. The project started on Facebook and grew organically into a huge community, both on and offline, comprised of hundreds of skilled volunteers in over 60 social projects all over the city. The projects can be anything from homeless centres, mentorship programs for underprivileged youth, working with the elderly or creative work with children. Through active exchange among refugees and natives, the projects aims at giving the opportunity for refugees to build a network of friends, allowing natives to develop knowledge of new cultures and traditions. Die Welt (The World in German) is a German national daily newspaper. *Die Welt* was founded in Hamburg in 1946 by the British occupying forces, aiming to provide a "quality newspaper" modeled on *The Time*. It originally carried news and British-viewpoint editorial content, but from 1947 it adopted a policy of providing two leading articles on major questions, one British and one German. The modern paper takes a self-described "liberal cosmopolitan" position in editing, but *Die Welt* is generally considered to be conservative. The average circulation of *Die Welt* is currently about 180,000 and the paper can be obtained in more than 130 countries. (<https://www.welt.de>)

Since its creation in 2007, the TF1 Foundation has been working on the professional integration and growth of youth from deprived neighbourhoods within the TF1 Group. TF1 Group is a French media holding company, owner of channel TF1, and the largest European private TV channel. To that day, about a hundred of young people between 18 and 30 years old have benefited from TF1 Foundation's professional training. Most of them now work for the TF1 Group, in all the departments of the company. Beyond their professional training, these young people also acquired strong knowledge in business and media. - *Le Monde* (The World in French) is a French daily afternoon newspaper with an average circulation of 323,039 copies per issue, about 40,000 of which are sold abroad. *Le Monde* was founded at the request of General Charles de Gaulle after the German army was driven from Paris during World War II. In contrast to other world newspapers such as *The New York Times*, *Le Monde* was traditionally focused on offering analysis and opinion, as opposed to being a newspaper of record. In recent years, however, the paper has established a greater distinction between fact and opinion. (<http://www.lemonde.fr/>)

StreetPress is a French news portal targeting an urban audience between 20 and 35 years old. The portal focuses mainly on local news and societal topics, with priority given to multimedia content. The team follows an open newsroom approach and encourages participatory journalism. Under the supervision of its editorial staff, StreetPress publishes pieces from non-professional reporters. The site is divided into the following sections: "Investigations", "Places" and "People". It also features comic strips from famous cartoonists. Nowadays in France, religious issues have become a source of tension between communities. This degradation of the social fabric feeds on ignorance and mutual incomprehension. ENQUETE seeks to promote life in community around the notion of secularism and to foster the acceptance of all beliefs, including atheism. To that end, ENQUETE has developed a tool-kit to help children from 7 to 11 learn more about religion from a secular and non-sectarian angle. The goal is to enable them to better

Editorially, *El Mundo* often expresses the mainstream views of the centre-right with independent and liberal overtones. *El Mundo* (The World in Spanish) is the second largest printed daily newspaper in Spain. The paper is considered one of the country's newspapers of record along with *El País* and *ABC*. *El Mundo* has played a key role in uncovering a number of scandals, among them embezzlement by the commander of the Guardia Civil and accusations of insider trading and tax fraud by the governor of the Central Bank of Spain. Foro Abraham is a non-profit association that seeks to enhance mutual knowledge between people of different religions through cultural and educational activities. Foro Abraham aims to create a space for interreligious and intercultural dialogue through an apolitical and non-denominational perspective to respect the beliefs of everyone involved in its activities. The mission of the Commission is to defend and promote human rights and the right to asylum. Today, the Commission counts more than 400 staff and 500 volunteers. Advisory Note

Schedule and meetings

In the cities we are going to visit, meetings have been arranged with local organizations and partners. They all lead busy professional lives and there might be some last minute changes in the program. This also implies that all information might not be available at the time of departure.

Meetings will not last longer than an hour to an hour and half. Please be mindful of that when you ask questions or share ideas, so everyone has a chance to participate. The Fellowship is an opportunity to network and to start long-term conversations and collaborations with the people you will meet. Do not hesitate to share your business cards.

Please come prepared. Read the agenda and research the organizations you are going to meet. Think about a series of questions you would like to ask. Wi-Fi might be available but we kindly ask that you do not use or check your cell-phones during meetings. There will be Wi-Fi in each hotel you will be staying at with plenty of time to catch up with emails and social media accounts.

Because in each city our stay is relatively short, the pace is going to be intense and sometimes demanding. It is important that you always have with you a bottle of water and some snacks in case meetings last longer than anticipated.

UNAOC and partners have been planning the program to ensure that everyone has a positive experience. However, if you face any challenges, do not hesitate to speak with the UNAOC Fellowship coordinator who will do their best to assist you. Please be respectful of other fellows and help out one another during the trip.

Meeting points

We will establish a meeting point and time for the beginning of each day and before each break. Please make sure you are always aware of where and when we meet so the group can be on time. We want to be courteous to our hosts and show respect. If you fail to arrive on time, it will be your responsibility to find a way to catch up with the group. Our schedule is busy and we can't afford to wait for late participants.

Passport and money

Please make a copy of your passport and visas before departure and bring these copies with you. Leave these copies at the hotel and have your passport with you at all time. You will be required to show a form of identification to enter most of the sites we will visit.

It is recommended to change money prior departure. The U.S. use US dollars, while Germany, France, and Spain use euros. When shopping, eating or going out, it is best that you pay in cash rather than by card. However try not to carry large amounts of money on you.

In Europe, taxes and service are included. However it is recommended to tip waiters with a couple of coins. It is not necessary to tip taxi drivers. In the U.S. however, taxes are not included so the amount

you will pay will always be higher than the prices indicated. Service fees are not included either, and it is strongly recommended to leave the equivalent of 15% to 20% of the total bill for gratuity. The same goes for taxi rides.

Transportation

We might have to use public transportation. If we do, you will be given a pass in each city that will be valid for the entirety of our stay. It is your responsibility to make sure you don't lose it. When using public transportation, please stay with the group and remain vigilant for pickpockets. Always make sure to know at which stop the group is getting off.

Dress Code

Formal business attire is required for meetings. You will be introduced as UNAOC Fellows and our counterparts expect to meet young professionals and civil society leaders.

Footwear

Wear comfortable footwear (no sneakers please when formal attire is requested) or have a change of shoes in your bag to walk between meetings. During cultural visits and outdoor activities, you can wear business casual attire. While travelling, wear comfortable clothes and shoes.

Local laws and customs

The United States, Germany, France, and Spain have diverse populations, with a multitude of cultural backgrounds. It is important to respect the beliefs of everyone we meet during the Fellowship.

Greetings

Standing up and shaking hands is the most common form of greetings. However in a less formal context and after having met a couple of times, it is not uncommon to exchange kisses on the cheek in Europe, or to hug in the United States. If you don't feel comfortable with these greeting practices, just extend your hand for a handshake and smile.

Liquor

Most restaurant and bars serve alcohol. However it is forbidden to drink alcohol in the street and on public transportation, especially in the United States.

Smoking

It is forbidden to smoke in most restaurants and bars in Europe. In the United States, it is forbidden to smoke in public spaces, restaurants, hotels, and bars unless stated otherwise.

Security

Washington D.C, New York, Berlin, Paris, and Madrid are generally safe. However, tourists are always more vulnerable than locals to small crime, especially at night. If you decide to explore the city on your own or to stay out late, remain vigilant and try to go with someone from the group. Avoid displaying expensive items such as smartphones, tablets, camera, and cash. Please inform the UNAOC Fellowship coordinator if you decide to go out on your own and provide a way to reach you in case of emergency.

Free time

During your free time, you are welcome to explore the city or to rest. Make sure you know where and when the group will meet next. If you have any questions or need advice, please ask the UNAOC Fellowship coordinator, the organizers, or the front desk at the hotel. Websites like TripAdvisor are also good sources of information for travellers. Please inform the UNAOC Fellowship coordinator if you decide to go out on your own and provide a way to reach you in case of emergency.

Health & Medication

Water is drinkable in all the cities that we will visit. In addition to the medication you might need to take at the time of travel, you might want to bring medication along with you in case of headaches, stomach-aches, etc.

Weather

The average temperature in October is:

- New York: 15°C/59°F
- Berlin: 9°C/48°F
- Paris: 11°C/52°F
- Madrid: 17°C/63°F
